

The Third Sunday of Lent ~ March 2 and 3, 2024

Traditions and Treasures

Not until the thirteenth century do we find a mention of a locked tabernacle. There's some evidence for Eucharistic towers also, but often these were in an obscure corner of the church, or even in the off-limits sacristy. Many of us grew up "making visits" to Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, but it's clear this would raise some medieval eyebrows in confusion! To the present day, the Eucharist is always reserved only in a side chapel in many cathedrals. The principal focus in a cathedral is always on the altar, symbol of Christ, and on the cathedra, symbol of the pastoral ministry of the bishop.

In your parish church there is probably a "sanctuary lamp," a permanently lit candle or oil lamp indicating the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. Sometimes it's in a red glass, not for any particular reason except that it's easy to find. There is a story of a bishop missioned to Papua New Guinea who was distressed to find no sanctuary lamps burning in his new diocese. The people patiently explained that their churches were woven of grass, and that they decided to place a chief's standard, a trident, in front of the tabernacle. That was a sign in their culture that the "chief" was at home, like raising the flag over Buckingham Palace. The bishop, an Irish import, didn't appreciate the British reference, so he ordered the candles back. The first church to burn to the ground was the cathedral, and after two more, the chief's tridents returned.

Lenten Season

We are looking to purchase new Altar Cloths for our Church. The altar cloths we are using are tattered and worn out. If you would like to help with this very important purchase, please place your donation in a plain white envelope marked "Altar Cloths" and place it in the collection basket at any of the Masses. Thank you for your help!

What is the meaning behind the Churches Liturgical Colors?

The purpose of utilizing different colors for vestments and altar cloths is two-fold:

First, the colors highlight the particular liturgical season and the faithful's journey through these seasons.

Second, the colors punctuate the liturgical season by highlighting a particular event or particular mystery of faith.

We are in the Season of Lent at this time in the Church. Violet or purple is used during Advent or Lent as a sign of Penance, Sacrifice and Preparation. This coincides with our Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving that we are all called to do during this Holiest of Seasons: Preparing ourselves for the Death and Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ.

GUIDE ON FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

Abstinence:

Begins on one's 14th birthday. Ash Wednesday and the Fridays of Lent. Abstain from meat.

Days of Fast:

Applies to everyone aged 18 to 59, inclusive. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

One full meal permitted and two other meals may be taken which, when combined, are less than a full meal.

If possible, the fast on Good Friday is continued until the Easter Vigil (on Holy Saturday night) as the "paschal fast" to honor the suffering and death of our Lord Jesus, and to prepare ourselves to share more fully and celebrate more readily His Resurrection.

Those that are excused from fast and abstinence outside the age limits include the physically or mentally ill including individuals suffering from chronic illnesses such as diabetes. Also excluded are pregnant or nursing women.


